Cyrus the Great Conquers Babylon

"In the first year of King Cyrus of Persia [538 BC], the LORD fulfilled the prophecy he had given through Jeremiah [25:11-12]. He stirred the heart of Cyrus to put this proclamation in writing and to send it throughout his kingdom" (Ezra 1:1 NLT).

Decree of Cyrus



"This is what Cyrus king of Persia says: 'The LORD, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth and he has appointed me to build a temple for him at Jerusalem in Judah. ³Any of his people among you may go up to Jerusalem in Judah and build the temple of the LORD, the God of Israel, the God who is in Jerusalem, and may their God be with them. ⁴And in any locality where survivors may now be living, the people are to provide them with silver and gold, with goods and livestock, and with freewill offerings for the temple of God in **Jerusalem' " (Ezra 1:2-4** NLT).

C. The restoration to the land under Ezra & Nehemiah related directly to God's purposes for Israel as stated in the promise to Abraham (Gen. 12:1-3).

2. <u>Relationship to the Abrahamic Covenant</u>

- a) God promised Abraham that his descendants would occupy the land from the River of Egypt to the Euphrates (Gen. 15:18), yet Israel in Babylon was living outside of these boundaries. The nation needed to return to the land.
- b) The <u>Messiah</u> had already been prophesied to be born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2).
- c) Intermarriage threatened the <u>purity of the Davidic line</u> to fulfill the seed promises originally given to Abraham.

"For Ezra had devoted himself to the study and observance of the Law of the LORD, and to teaching its decrees and laws in Israel" (Ezra 7:10 NIV).

God Approved Divorce under Ezra?

Issue: How could God approve of divorce here when He elsewhere disapproves of it and even says clearly, "I hate divorce" (Mal. 2:16; cf. Matt. 19:8)?

- The text doesn't specifically say that God approved of divorce. One solution could have been for the 113 men to leave the community with their families. However, for the sake of argument, the other reasons below are offered...
- The account serves to illustrate that maintaining the purity of the covenant people of God was more important than even keeping some individual families intact.
- Although 113 men may seem to be a small number, since this included leaders of the people, the intermarriage was certainly going to spread further to all the common people as had happened in the Jewish community in Egypt & the kingdom of Israel to the north.

This small beginning led to the first century AD restoration of Jerusalem
