
The rejection of John by Israel's leaders is paralleled in the rising opposition to Christ and His offer of the kingdom
















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B. The Curse of the Cities of Galilee

§ 61 Matthew 11:20-30

Christ curses Galilean cities that saw his miracles but would not believe to show how Gentiles received him more than the Jews.

Then Jesus began to denounce the cities in which most of his miracles had been performed, because they did not repent.

"Woe to you, Korazin! Woe to you Bethsaida!

If the miracles that were performed in you had been performed in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes. But I tell you, it will be more bearable for for Tyre and Sidon on the day of judgment than for you.

And you, Capernaum, will you be lifted up to the skies? ... It will be more bearable for Sodom on the day of judgment than for you."

Christ condemns the unbelieving Jewish area of Galilee with greater judgment than Gentiles who saw no signs

Matthew 11:25-27

Galilean cities persist in unbelief because of Israel's spiritual blindness stemming from a history of willful rejection of God's revelation

3. Invitation to Belief

Matthew 11:28-30


Despite condemning them, Christ offers rest from the taxing submission to Pharisaical regulations by trusting in His person

C. Reception by a Sinner

§ 62 Luke 7:36-50

Christ reveals the self-righteous Pharisees when they hear Him forgive a repentant woman at Simon the Pharisee's home

No. In Luke she is not named but in the other gospels she is clearly Mary of Bethany

This was NOT like Luke 7:36-50 with Jesus and the Sinful Woman



The Two Anointings of Jesus

Common to all four gospel accounts:

- 1. Unannounced visit by woman
- 2. Anointed Jesus' head and/or feet
- 3. Wiped his feet with her hair
- 4. Complaint of waste by disciples/Judas
- 5. Disciples rebuked by Jesus
- 6. In a home
- 7. Alabaster jar (except in John)
- 8. Home owned by man called Simon



Blasphemy Verses

- 1. Matt. 12:31-32 "So I tell you, every sin and blasphemy can be forgiven—except blasphemy against the Holy Spirit, which will never be forgiven. ³²Anyone who speaks against the Son of Man can be forgiven, but anyone who speaks against the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven, either in this world or in the world to come.
- 2. Mark 3:28-29 "I tell you the truth, all sin and blasphemy can be forgiven, ²⁹but anyone who blasphemes the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven. This is a sin with eternal consequences."

Unacceptable Views of the Blasphemy

- 1. Using Christ's name in vain
- 2. A sinful lifestyle that causes a Christian to lose his salvation forever (not repentable)
- 3. Cessationists will not go to heaven

Unacceptable Views of the Blasphemy

- 4. This sin could only happen during His earthly ministry and thus cannot happen today. Jesus isn't physically here performing miracles—it must be be committed to His face.
- 5. A <u>non-Christian's unbelief</u> which lasts until death







The Context of the Text



- 1. Christ healed a blind/mute (Matt. 12:22)
- 2. The crowds claimed, "He's Messiah!"
- 3. The Pharisees said, "He's demonic!"
- 4. Jesus gave a threefold response (12:25-29)

When the queen of Sheba heard of Solomon's fame, which brought honor to the name of the LORD, she came to test him with hard questions.



G. Rejection of the Nation by Christ

Matthew 12:46-50; Mark 3:31-35; Luke 8:19-21

In response to rejection by Israel's leaders, Jesus sets aside Israel for a new form of the kingdom in the Interadvent age

Summary Statement



This book:

- (1) proves Jesus as *Messiah* for unbelieving Jews to trust Him, and
- (2) explains that the kingdom promised to Israel is *delayed* due to Israel's rejection of Jesus as King for *believing* Jews to see His present kingdom authority as residing in the Church.

IV. (11:1–16:12) Christ is rejected as Messiah in anticipation of the final crucifixion rejection, so He introduces the Interadvent Age before His future reception and ministers to Gentiles to teach the postponement of the kingdom.




































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
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PARABLES BY THE SEA (outside the house to the multitudes)

1. THE SOILS (13:3-9, 18-23)

Planting

Issue: Why have Israel and the leaders rejected the Messiah?

Main Idea: Receptivity determines productivity, which is a heart issue.

2. THE TARES (13:24-30, 36-43)

Planting

Issue: What accounts for the false religiosity in the world?

Main Idea: Satan sowed a counterfeit kingdom in the world, which will not be

fully revealed until the judgment.

3. THE MUSTARD SEED (13:31-32)

Growth

The Parables of Matthew 13

Issue: Will this Interadvent survive?

Main Idea: It will start small, but the new program will grow worldwide.

4. THE LEAVENING PROCESS (13:33) Growth

Issue: How will this new kingdom grow?

Main Issue: The kingdom will grow from an internal dynamic (Holy Spirit), not from an external organization (Judaism).

- 1. THE HID TREASURE (13:44) Value
 - Issue: How valuable should this new-profound kingdom of God be to us?

Main Idea: God's kingdom is so valuable a man should give up everything to

be part of it.

2. THE PEARL MERCHANT (13:45-46) Value

Issue: How valuable is this kingdom to Christ?

The Parables of Matthew 13

Main Idea: The kingdom was established though Christ's total self sacrifice.

3. THE DRAGNET (13:47-50) Responsibility

Issue: How wide should the invitation to the kingdom be made?

Main Idea: Evangelism should be done without discrimination.

4. THE HOUSEHOLDER (13:52) Responsibility

Issue: What are the responsibilities of disciples in the kingdom?

Main Idea: We must teach both old and new truths about God's kingdom program. One key new truth not taught in the OT is the church age of Jews and Gentiles without discrimination (Eph. 3:3-6, 9 vs. Zech. 8:23).

Christ shows his messianic authority by healing an unclean woman and raising Jairus' daughter by touching and being touched

5. Power Over Blindness

Two blind men healed by Jesus prove him as Messiah who can remove Israel's spiritual blindness if the nation believes





























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
