Universal Savior Sovereignly Advances the Kingdom

Key Verse

"For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost" (19:10).

Summary Statement

The sovereignly directed progress of the kingdom message from the Jewish rejection of Jesus as Messiah to Gentile acceptance should confirm the faith of Gentile believers by affirming Him as Savior of believing Gentiles as well as Jews.

Kingdom Statement

The concept of the "kingdom" and the "kingdom of God" appears at least 42 times (e.g., 1:33; 4:43; 6:20; 7:28; 8:1, 10; 9:2, 11, 27, 60, 62; 10:9, 11; 11:2, 17, 18, 20; 12:31, 32; 13:18, 20, 28, 29; 14:15; 16:16; 17:20a, 20b, 21; 18:16, 17, 24, 25, 29; 19:11; 21:10, 31; 22:16, 18, 29, 30, 23:42, 51).

Covenant

Jesus is the fulfillment of the Abrahamic and Davidic Covenants (e.g., 1:54-55, 69, 72-73). The New Covenant is also mentioned once (22:20) where the cup of the Lord's supper fulfills the promise of forgiveness in Jeremiah 31:34.

Redemption


Christ's redemptive mission is noted, often quoting and/or alluding to Isaiah 53 and 40–66 (22:37; 24:27, 44, 46). He is the Savior of believing Gentiles as well as Jews, so Jesus is the universal Savior who pays for the sins of the entire world.

Jesus (Messianic Prophecy)

Jesus is truly man with his genealogy starting at Adam (3:37), who, like Jesus, was a perfect man. Jesus especially fulfills this role by using the title "Son of Man"—a term used in Daniel 7:13-14 for the Messiah who will bring in the kingdom.



Title

- The Greek title (Κατά Λυκὰν
 According to Luke) was added to this volume at a very early date.
- That the Book of Acts served as a companion volume is evident in that both books are addressed to Theophilus (Luke 1:3; Acts 1:1).



External Evidence


Church Fathers of the latter half of the 2nd century agreed that Luke, "the beloved physician" (Col. 4:14), wrote this Gospel which bears his name:

The earliest evidence for Lukan authorship – Muratorian Canon and the Anti-Marcionite Prologue.

Further citations to Lukan authorship are given by Irenaeus, Tertullian, Clement of Alexandria, Origen, Eusebius, and Jerome.

Internal Evidence

- 1. Several factors signify that Luke and Acts had the same author.
- 2. The "we sections" in Acts
- 3. Use of more technical medical terms is compatible with authorship by a doctor



Date

Circumstances



Origin/Recipients

- Assuming the dating presented is correct, Luke wrote from Caesarea. He clearly wrote to Theophilus.
- The title of "most excellent" for Theophilus probably indicates that he was an official. As a man of high social standing, he may have assumed responsibility for publishing Luke and Acts.

Circumstances



In line with writing to Gentiles, Luke:

- Translates Aramaic terms
- Traces Christ's genealogy to Adam
- Refers to Roman rulers for dating
- Avoids noting fulfilled prophecies
- Quotes the Septuagint
- Explains Jewish customs, and
- Explains Israel's geography.

Occasion

Undoubtedly Theophilus considered Luke a tremendous source to provide an orderly account of the life of Christ.

Luke wrote to strengthen the wealthy Christian's faith by showing that his faith rested on firm historical facts.

Perhaps even more significantly, Luke sought to explain to his wider Gentile audience how Christ died for the entire world after being rejected by Israel.

Luke's Gospel is written from a Gentile mind to the Gentile mind to confirm Theophilus' faith but also to answer how the Jewish Savior could be a Savior for Gentiles. Luke performs this task masterfully by tracing the divinely directed kingdom message from Jews to Gentiles. Since Israel has rejected its Messiah, all men can receive salvation by simple faith. This message is continued in Luke's Book of Acts, which chronicles the kingdom message from its reception by Jerusalem Jews to Gentiles in the uttermost part of the Roman Empire.

When Baby Jesus disappeared last year from a Nativity scene on the lawn of the Wellington, Fla., community center, village officials didn't follow a star to locate him.








(1:5–4:13) The pre-public life of Christ in His advent and preparation for ministry are recorded to show God's orderly and sovereignly directed plan in a Semitic context but with universal overtones.

Even at age 12 Jesus knew His real Father

(4:14–21:38) Christ's ministry in Galilee, en route to Jerusalem, and within the city show Israel's rejection of Christ as Messiah and His judgment by turning to the Gentiles during the times of the Gentiles.



































