Taking the Bible literally until it clearly isn't meant to be is not just an academic exercise—it's foundational to our faith. Why? Because our approach to Scripture directly impacts how we understand the core teachings of Christianity.

Here's why this matters for the biggest doctrines:

Creation

Genesis 1-2 describes the origin of the universe, life, and humanity.

- If we treat Creation as purely symbolic, we lose the foundation for understanding:

 - o Why sin entered the world (the Fall of Adam and Eve Genesis 3).

Prophecy

Hundreds of prophecies in the Bible were fulfilled literally.

- Isaiah **prophesied Jesus' birth** from a virgin (Isaiah 7:14) and His crucifixion (Isaiah 53:5-7).
- Micah predicted Jesus would be born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2).
- If past prophecies were fulfilled literally, why would future ones (like Jesus' return) be only symbolic?

 If we don't take prophecy seriously, we risk missing God's plan for the future.

Miracles

The Bible is full of miraculous events—should we assume they are just metaphors?

- Jesus literally walked on water (Matthew 14:25).
- He physically rose from the dead (Luke 24:39-43).
- Moses actually parted the Red Sea (Exodus 14:21-22).

If we reduce miracles to allegory, we lose the power of God's intervention in history.

If God is real, supernatural events should not surprise us.

Heaven & Hell

Jesus spoke of eternal destinations in very real terms.

- Heaven: "In My Father's house are many rooms..." (John 14:2-3).
- Hell: "There will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." (Matthew 25:46).

Some try to reinterpret Hell as symbolic or Heaven as a state of mind—but Jesus never treated them that way.

If Heaven and Hell aren't real, then why did Jesus die to save us?

Most Major Doctrines

Christianity stands on key truths that must be taken literally:

- The Resurrection If Jesus only "symbolically" rose, we are still in our sins (1 Corinthians 15:17).
- Salvation by Grace If Adam and Eve's Fall wasn't real, then what are we saved from?
- Jesus as God If Jesus' deity is just a metaphor, then who paid for our sins?

If we don't take the Bible literally where it clearly intends to be, we risk losing the foundation of our faith.
