

Kingdom Statement

The judgment of Jerusalem was inevitable due to her refusal to obey the old covenant (1-19), yet after a 70-year captivity (25:11-12) and judgment on the Gentiles, Israel will submit to God's rule under a new covenant (30-33).



Summary Statement

The deserved fall of Jerusalem, 70-year captivity, judgment of Gentiles, and restoration under a new covenant give hope and exhort Judah to accept God's inevitable discipline by yielding to Babylon.

Covenant

The old covenant tablets of stone leading to Israel's judgment will be replaced with a new covenant of blessing through the Holy Spirit's indwelling their hearts after repentance and forgiveness (31:31-33).

Redemption

Redemption in a spiritual renewal (chapters 30–33) awaits Israel after her unfaithfulness ends, which is a redemption that will occur because Israel will never cease to exist as a nation (31:35-37).

Messiah


The Shepherd Messiah and Righteous Branch (23:1-8) and the new covenant he brings (31:31-33) point to Christ's rule and the forgiveness in his blood he portrayed in the Lord's supper (Luke 22:20).

Jeremiah - Yirməyāhū in Hebrew


From either of 2 roots meaning "cast, shoot" or "loosen":

- 2. "Yahweh throws," perhaps in the sense of laying a foundation






Who was Jeremiah?






- Son of Hilkiah, a priest (Jer. 1:1)
- Lived in town of Anathoth
 3 miles (5 km.) NE of Jerusalem
- Began his ministry around 20 years old
- Was well-off enough to buy a field (Jer. 32)






Chart of the Exile



The Babylonian Exile



Jeremiah prophesied from the 13th year of Josiah (627 BC) past the fall of Judah (586 BC) to about 580 BC.

His ministry spanned 4 decades and the reigns of 5 kings of Judah.



- 3. JEHOIACHIN (son of Jehoiakim) a ninety-day wonder judged by God
- 4. ZEDEKIAH (uncle of Jehoiachin) Judah's final king

- 6. GEDALIAH Babylonian-appointed governor of occupied city of Jerusalem
- 7. JOHANAN Successor of Gedaliah who was assassinated





- 1. Assyria: Since 722 BC, Assyria dominated Jerusalem.
- 2. <u>Babylon</u>: In 612 BC Nineveh, Assyria's capital, fell to Babylon. This meant Judah would be subject to Babylon.
- 3. <u>Egypt</u>: Assyria-Babylon conflicts gave Egypt control of Israel. Pharaoh Neco killed Josiah of Judah in 609 BC, then his son Jehoahaz ruled 3 months. Neco replaced him with his brother Jehoiakim.




4. <u>Babylon</u>: When Egypt was defeated by Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon at the Battle of Carchemish (605 BC), Jehoiakim switched allegiance from Egypt to Babylon.

Campaigns

Egypt: Four years later (601 BC), Egypt defeated Nebuchadnezzar and Jehoiakim switched his allegiance back to Egypt. What a mistake!


Babylon: In 597 BC
Nebuchadnezzar attacked
Jerusalem and killed
Jehoiakim. He was replaced
with Jehoiachin but 3 months
later he deported him to
Babylon with 10,000 others.
He was replaced with his
uncle Zedekiah, who ruled 11

of Jerusalem in 586 BC.


How was judgment inevitable?

- 1. The people are encouraged to repent only up until chapter 19 (e.g., 15:19; 17:24; 18:8; cf. 5:3; 8:6). Yet after this point no exhortations to repent are forthcoming.
- 2. Jeremiah was instructed by God not even to pray for the people of Judah (11:14; 14:11).
- 3. Jeremiah told the people that each could individually have life instead of death if he/she would surrender to the Babylonians, but the destruction still would come on the nation as a whole (21:8-9; 24:1-10; 27:5-12, 16-17; 32:5; 38:17-23; 42:9-22; 52:24-27).

How was judgment inevitable?

- 4. God's determination of the length of the captivity at 70 years indicates that judgment was unavoidable (25:11-12; 29:10).
- 5. Jeremiah smashed a pot to illustrate that God's decision to destroy the city was not retractable (19:1-2, 10-11).
- 6. Jeremiah instructed those already in exile to settle down (29:4-14) in contrast to the false prophet Hananiah, who said the exile would only last two years (28:1-3, 10-12). This indicates that the "die was already cast" and even repentance of the people could not forestall God's judging hand.

Seal of Immer



The clay sealing (Bulla) of Hişilyahu son of Immer, a member of the priestly Immer family, who served in the administration of the Temple treasury.

This seal was used by Immer, father of Pashur in Jeremiah 20:1 (ESV)— "When the priest Pashhur son of Immer, the official in charge of the temple of the Lord, heard Jeremiah prophesying these things, he had Jeremiah the prophet beaten and put in the stocks at the Upper Gate of Benjamin at the Lord's temple."

Good figs

- Exiles in Babylon who had begun to repent
- God will take care of them and bring them back

Bad, rotten figs

- King Zedekiah and his court and all people in Jerusalem
- Still plotting and scheming against Babylon
- Not fit to keep

Jeremiah's Application: "Leave Jerusalem"



Jeremiah 24 portrayed all the Jews as two types of figs during Babylon's siege: 1.The "bad figs" who refused to submit to God's discipline by the **Babylonians would** disobey God by staying in the city and dying. 2.The "good figs" would spare their lives by leaving the city to surrender to the Babylonians outside!

"What then is the 'old covenant' in contrast with the 'new covenant' in Christ? It is not the whole of the Old Testament, because the covenants with Abraham and David are never called 'old' in the New Testament. Rather, only the covenant under Moses, the covenant made at Mount Sinai (Ex. 19-24) is called the 'old covenant' (2 Cor. 3:14; cf. Heb. 8:6, 13), to be replaced by the "new covenant" in Christ (Luke 22:20; 1 Cor. 11:25; 2 Cor. 3:6; Heb. 8:8, 13; 9:15; 12:24).
