Key Verse

(Daniel to God) "...Praise be to the name of God for ever and ever; wisdom and power are his. He changes times and seasons; he sets up kings and deposes them..."

(2:20-21a).

Kingdom Statement

God's sovereignty remains steadfast despite the rise and fall of many nations until the establishment of kingdom blessing under His Messianic Ruler (9:24-27).



Summary Statement

The Judean exiles should be encouraged of God's sovereign control over all nations to preserve Israel between Nebuchadnezzar's invasion of Jerusalem (605 BC) and the establishment of the Kingdom blessings under the Messiah.


Covenant

The covenant of an imposter Messiah (9:27) in the mold of Antiochus (Dan. 11:22-32) will be squelched (11:36-45) and replaced with the True Messiah who alone keeps his covenants (9:4).

Redemption

God alone saves (3:17, 29; 6:27) since all other kingdoms and rulers are ultimately powerless.






Chart of the Exile


"[Cyrus] placed a portion of his army at the point where the river enters the city, and another body at the back of the place where it issues forth, with orders to march into the town by the bed of the stream, as soon as the water became shallow enough: he then himself drew off with the unwarlike portion of his host, and made for the place where Nitocris dug the basin for the river, where he did exactly what she had done formerly: he turned the Euphrates by a canal into the basin, which was then a marsh, on which the river sank to such an extent that the natural bed of the stream became fordable.

"Hereupon the Persians who had been left for the purpose at Babylon by the river-side, entered the stream, which had now sunk so as to reach about midway up a man's thigh, and thus got into the town.


"Had the Babylonians been apprised of what Cyrus was about, or had they noticed their danger, they would never have allowed the Persians to enter the city, but would have destroyed them utterly; for they would have made fast all the street-gates which gave upon the river, and mounting upon the walls along both sides of the stream, would so have caught the enemy, as it were, in a trap. But, as it was, the Persians came upon them by surprise and so took the city. Owing to the vast size of the place, the inhabitants of the central parts (as the residents at Babylon declare) long after the outer portions of the town were taken, knew nothing of what had chanced, but as they were engaged in a festival, continued dancing and reveling until they learnt the capture but too certainly. Such, then, were the circumstances of the first taking of Babylon."

Darius Humbled

Darius the Mede conquered Belshazzar (grandson of Nebuchadnezzar). Darius also acknowledged God's sovereignty:

I make a decree that in all the dominion of my kingdom men are to fear and tremble before the God of Daniel; For He is the living God and enduring forever, and His kingdom is one which will not be destroyed and His dominion [will be] forever. He delivers and rescues and performs signs and wonders in heaven and on earth, who has [also] delivered Daniel from the power of the lions."

Where's the main division of the book?

Since beasts represent nations in both chapters 7 and 8, some scholars link these two chapters. This makes the major division of the book at 1–6 and 7–12.

But the division of 1–7 and 8–12 better sees the book as a whole. How is this?

Support for Dividing Daniel Between Chapters 7 & 8

- 1. The Aramaic part is chapters 2–7 (not 1–6). Therefore, a division after chapter 7 treats the book the way it presents itself. An example of the link is that the Aramaic word for God (אַלֹבְּיֵלֵי) in chapters 1–6 also appears in chapter 7.
- 2. The man Daniel appears in the third person in chapters 1–7. But chapters 8–12 are written in the first person.
- 3. Chapters 1–7 focus on Gentiles whereas in chapters 8–12 Daniel's visions all focus on Jews.



Support for Successive Kingdoms View

"The successive-kingdoms view avoids the nebulous nature of the symbolic view, is consistent with the Old Testament imagery from Daniel 7, and provides a consistent interpretation of the eight kings. For these reasons this is the preferred view. Therefore Revelation 17:9-11 offers no support for the early date of Revelation based on the idea that Nero is the sixth king."



Rev. 17:10 has no reference to Nero or Domitian as Beale affirms.





1. King Nebuchadnezzar's act of besieging the Jerusalem was not only by his own might and strength, but it was God who had given King Jehoiakim into his hand (1:1-2).

In the third year of the reign of Jehoiakim king of Judah, Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon came to Jerusalem and besieged it. The Lord gave Jehoiakim king of Judah into his hand, along with some of the vessels of the house of God; and he brought them to the land of Shinar, to the house of his god, and he brought the vessels into the treasury of his god.

2. God granted Daniel favor and compassion in the sight of the commander of the officials, when Daniel steadfastly resisted the cultural pressure to compromise (1:9).



3. God gave the four Jewish youth intelligence in many fields and Daniel could understand all visions and dreams.

"As for these four youths, <u>God</u> gave them knowledge and intelligence in every [branch of] literature and wisdom; Daniel even understood all [kinds of] visions and dreams" (1:17).

4. The God of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego controlled the forces of nature to humble Nebuchadnezzar through the furnace (ch. 3) and Darius through Daniel in the lions' den (ch. 6).

5. God gave Daniel ability to interpret dreams and visions that perplexed the nobles and wise men in Babylon (chs. 2, 4, 5)

6. By handwriting on the wall God showed His sovereign control over nations and individual rulers (ch. 5)

I. GOD IS SOVEREIGN OVER ALL PEOPLE

7. Daniel not only prophesied against Babylon but also later empires that opposed God and oppressed His people everywhere (ch. 2). Rulers of the world fight against the kingdom of God!

Daniel answered the king, "As for the mystery about which the king has inquired, neither wise men, conjurers, magicians [nor] diviners are able to declare [it] to the king. However, there is a God in heaven who reveals mysteries, and He has made known to King Nebuchadnezzar what will take place in the latter days. This was your dream and the visions in your mind [while] on your bed" (2:27-28).

8. Daniel had a vision of four beasts (nations) that threatened to exterminate God's people. But the Ancient of Days prevailed to establish an eternal kingdom for his people. Thus, God's sovereignty is shown in human history (ch. 7).




Daniel's friends: Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego replied to the king, "O Nebuchadnezzar, we do not need to give you an answer concerning this matter.

If it be [so], our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the furnace of blazing fire; and He will deliver us out of your hand, O king. But [even] if [He does] not, let it be known to you, O king, that we are not going to serve your gods or worship the golden image that you have set up."





"Then the commissioners and satraps began trying to find a ground of accusation against Daniel in regard to government affairs; but they could find no ground of accusation or... corruption, inasmuch as he was faithful, and no negligence or corruption was... found in him. Then these men said, 'We will not find any ground of accusation against this Daniel unless we find [it] against him with regard to the law of his God.'...

"Then the king gave orders, and Daniel was brought in and cast into the lions' den. The king... said to Daniel, 'Your God whom you constantly serve will Himself deliver you'" (Daniel 6:4-5, 16).

1. Suffering persecution will occur in each believer's life who is standing on the law of God. Loyalty to God's Word brings us even death (chs. 3, 6), but God will vindicate us through resurrection and judgment at the


end as ch. 12 depicts.
2. Through every circumstance of life it is possible to live a <u>life of faith</u> and victory with God's help (3:24-27; 6:19-24). This is living under the sovereignty of God.



- 1. Persecution will occur in each believer's life who is standing on the law of God. Loyalty to God's Word brings us even death (ch. 3, 6), but God will vindicate us through resurrection and judgment at the end as ch. 12 depicts.

- 3. The NT teaches even more on the suffering of God's people:
 - people:
 "Blessed are the persecuted ... for theirs is the kingdom of God" (Matt. 5:10-12)
 - "All who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will be persecuted" (2 Tim. 3:12)

Chapter 1:

God sent Babylon to besiege Jerusalem because of Judah's pride

This contrasted with the obedient people of God. Daniel and his three friends did not want to go against the law of God.

Woe to the rebellious children...
Who proceed down to Egypt
Without consulting Me,
To take refuge in the safety of Pharaoh
And to seek shelter in the shadow of
Egypt! (Isa. 30:1-2)

Woe to those who go down to Egypt for help. [And] rely on horses, and trust in chariots because they are many and in horsemen because they are very strong, but they do not look to the Holy One of Israel, nor seek the Lord! ...
Return to Him from whom you have deeply defected, O sons of Israel (Isa. 31:1,6)

Chapter 2:

1. Nebuchadnezzar's dream was revealed to Daniel by God alone. This contrasts with human pride which has no ability to discern God's message.

"The Chaldeans answered the king and said, 'There is not a man on earth who could declare the matter for the king, inasmuch as no great king or ruler has [ever] asked anything like this of any magician, conjurer or Chaldean.'

'Moreover, the thing which the king demands is difficult, and there is no one else who could declare it to the king except gods, whose dwelling place is not with [mortal] flesh'' (2:10-11).

2. The mighty kingdoms are destroyed by other kingdoms, but God's kingdom will never be destroyed. Human pride will finally be destroyed!

In the days of those kings the God of heaven will set up a kingdom which will never be destroyed, and [that] kingdom will not be left for another people; it will crush and put an end to all these kingdoms, but it will itself endure forever. Inasmuch as you saw that a stone was cut out of the mountain without hands and that it crushed the iron, the bronze, the clay, the silver and the gold, the great God has made known to the king what will take place in the future; so the dream is true and its interpretation is trustworthy.


Chapter 3:

Nebuchadnezzar's pride is subdued by God's miraculous work in protecting Daniel's 3 friends.

His arrogant proclamation in v. 7 is contrasted with his humble proclamation in v. 29.

Verse 7:

"Therefore at that time, when all the peoples heard the sound of the horn, flute, lyre, trigon, psaltery, bagpipe and all kinds of music, all the peoples, nations and [men of every] language fell down [and] worshiped the golden image that Nebuchadnezzar the king had set up."



Verse 29:

"Therefore I make a decree that <u>any</u> <u>people, nation or tongue</u> that speaks anything offensive against the God of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego shall be torn limb from limb and their houses reduced to a rubbish heap, inasmuch as there is no other god who is able to deliver in this way."

"The tree that you saw, which became large and grew strong, whose height reached to the sky and was visible to all the earth and whose foliage [was] beautiful and its fruit abundant, and in which [was] food for all, under which the beasts of the field dwelt and in whose branches the birds of the sky lodged-- it IS YOU, O KING; for you have become great and grown strong, and your majesty has become great and reached to the sky and your dominion to the end of the earth."



4:20-22



"This is the interpretation, O king, and this is the decree of the Most High, which has come upon my lord the king, that you be driven away from mankind and your dwelling place BE WITH THE BEASTS OF THE FIELD, and you be given grass to eat like cattle and be drenched with the dew of heaven; and seven periods of time will pass over you, UNTIL YOU RECOGNIZE THAT THE MOST HIGH IS RULER OVER THE REALM OF MANKIND and bestows it on whomever He wishes" (4:24-25).

Chapter 5:

Belshazzar's arrogance was subdued, for he was using the temple vessels and praising gods of idolatry.



"This is the interpretation of the message:

`MENE'--God has numbered your kingdom and put an end to it. `TEKEL'--you have been weighed on the scales and found deficient. `PERES'--your kingdom has been divided and given over to the Medes and Persians... That same night Belshazzar the Chaldean king was slain" (5:26-28, 30).

Chapter 6:

Daniel's fellow officers were jealous of Daniel and tricked King Darius to cast Daniel into lions' den. The death of the his accusers in the same den instead of Daniel contrasts human pride with honoring God.



"The king then gave orders, and they brought those men who had maliciously accused Daniel, and they cast them, their children and their wives into the lions' den; and they had not reached the bottom of the den before the lions overpowered them and crushed all their bones" (6:24).

Chapter 7:

Four great beasts in Daniel's vision symbolize kings or kingdoms who will arise from the earth. **But these kingdoms** will be finally destroyed. God will give His people an everlasting kingdom when Jesus returns and establishes it. Human pride will be destroyed.



"Then the sovereignty, the dominion and the greatness of [all] the kingdoms under the whole heaven will be given to the people of the saints of the Highest One; His kingdom [will be] an everlasting kingdom, and all the dominions will serve and obey Him" (Dan. 7:27; Rev. 13)



IV. GOD'S MESSIAH OF THE WORLD

"And behold, with the clouds of heaven One like a Son of Man was coming, and He came up to the Ancient of Days and was presented before Him. And to Him was given dominion, glory and a kingdom, that all the peoples, nations and [men of every] language might serve Him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion which will not pass away; And His kingdom is one which will not be destroyed."


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The Son of Man & Ancient of Days

"I watched as thrones were put in place and the Ancient One sat down to judge. His clothing was as white as snow, his hair like purest wool. 

- Live a godly life



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


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


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
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
