Summary Statement

Destructions of both Edom in the near future and all nations in the day of the LORD will come as God's judgment for their opposing Judah, but Judah can be comforted with a promise of blessing due to God's protection in the Land Covenant.





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


Time Periods of the Prophets

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




* The prophets were not pushovers. They went against the tide to preach the word of Yahweh to a rebellious nation.






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Topography of Israel

Authorship: External Evidence

Most probably:

- Ahab's servant who hid the prophets of God in a cave (1 Kings 18:3)
- One of the three prophets who wrote exclusively about a non-Jewish nation
 - Habakkuk wrote about Babylon
 - Nahum wrote about Assyria
 - Obadiah wrote about Edom



Authorship: External Evidence 595

- Common name 12 times in OT
- **Different possibilities**

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- 1. Ahab's servant who hid the prophets of God in a cave (1 Kings 18:3)
- 2. Jehoshaphat's official sent by the king to teach the law in Judah (2 Chron. 17:7)
- 3. Josiah's temple repair overseer who was a Levite (2 Chron. 34:12)
- 4. Ezra's leader who returned from the Exile (Ezra 8:9)
- 5. A priest involved in the revival of Nehemiah's time (Neh. 10:5)
- Most probably option 1 Identified by Talmud and followed by Jerome

Internal Evidence

* No evidence for the exact author – "The vision of Obadiah" (1:1a) - NOT clear
* No mention of his father's name, home region, or the reign of a king
* Probably lived in the southern kingdom
* Probably not from a royal or priestly line

Audience

 Originally delivered to the southern kingdom and not to Edom itself.

Because of the mention of the Jerusalem (vv. 11, 20; "Mt. Zion" in vv. 17, 21) and Judah (v. 12; "Jacob" in vv. 17-18)

The Palace of Petra, a temple in Greek style (Hellenic), is also called "The Treasury" and is 42 meters high




It was carved completely in calcareous rock. But the palace is only one among the many magnificent constructions in Petra, all carved in calcareous rock.





Obadiah prophesies a message of judgment upon Edom as a comfort to the people of Judah who have seen Edom gloat over the recent devastation of Jerusalem by the **Philistines and Arabs.**

Summary Statement

Destructions of both Edom in the near future and all nations in the day of the LORD will come as God's judgment for their opposing Judah, but Judah can be comforted with a promise of blessing due to God's protection in the Land Covenant.

Verses 1-14

The LORD through Obadiah describes Edom's future destruction for doing injustices to Judah to comfort Judah with His protective hand.

Verses 15-21

Obadiah describes the day of the LORD as God's judgment on end times nations who opposed Judah but His blessing upon Judah to comfort His people with His faithfulness to the Land Covenant.

Theology

It gives hope for God's people: Obadiah gave the people concrete hope in that he declared the defeat of a perennial enemy, Edom.

- Judah can be assured of God's justice in that Edom would be humiliated.
- God has not forsaken his people.
- God is just and faithful to his covenant with Israel.

 Edom stands as a type of all who oppose the purposes of the LORD. Whatever Obadiah says about Edom applies equally to any nation that sets itself against the LORD and His people.

Problem #1

The NT writers quote literally hundreds of citations from every major section of the OT. Yet, the **Book of Obadiah is not** quoted even once. If it is inspired, then why isn't it cited at least once?

- Many OT books are not directly quoted in the NT (e.g., Ruth, 1-2 Chronicles, Esther, Song of Songs and Ecclesiastes). However, all these books were considered inspired by both Jews and Christians.
- Being quoted in the NT was not a test for the inspiration in the OT. Rather, it was whether it was written by a spokesperson accredited by God and accepted by His people. Obadiah meets this test.
- NT writers had no occasion to quote from every OT book. Few Christians now quote 1 Kings, yet the NT did (Rom. 11:4). Indeed, few believers ever cite 2 or 3 John, and yet they were part of the inspired Word. How often a book is quoted does not determine whether it is inspired.

Problem #2

Obadiah is a message of divine moral judgment on the nations. Of the 21 verses in this book...

- * 16 pronounce judgment against Edom
- 5 prophesy Israel's future triumph over Edom

But isn't this simply Jewish nationalism rather than a revelation of God?

 The Book of Obadiah reveals the sovereignty of God amid national disgrace and defeat. The impotence of God's people against their enemies reflected upon the power of the God of Israel. Was Yahweh a defeated God? Was He powerless to resist the enemies of His people?

 "No!" is Obadiah's resounding reply! The God of Israel will keep His promises even though the future looks black. The nations have not understood that their temporary victory over God's people was the very work of God.

 The message of Obadiah is that Israel's God is always in complete control, and He accomplishes His purpose. It is a message of faith, hope, and triumph against the enemies of God.

 But the triumph of Israel will be a blessing to all nations. Israel's apostasy brought judgment.

"For if [Israel's] rejection is the reconciliation of the world, what will their acceptance be but life from the dead? (Rom. 11:15).

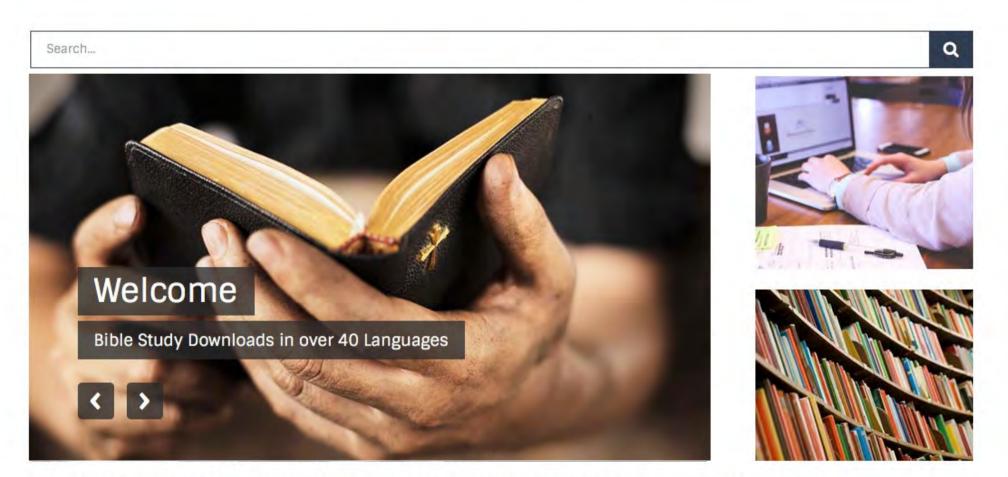
 This book is not simply an expression of Jewish nationalism.
